



to bridging academia and industry, fostering innovation, and cultivating industry-ready graduates in retail management.




United Efforts Toward a Planetary Health Breakthrough




Inception of the Challenge Cup

Love a good mystery wrapped in

folklore? The Fox Wife transports

the Qing dynasty's final years,

shapeshifting fox spirits.

MOUNT CHAR

So begins The Library at Mount Char, a dark, bizarre tale of murder, betrayal, and family. The book explores the fraught relationships between abusive parents and victimised children, tracing the way household trauma can shape children into people like their abusers. It unfolds like a puzzle, with scattered details slowly revealing Carolyn, her enigmatic family, and the supernatural Library at its core.

A blend of fantasy, mystery, and horror, Mount Char is as confounding as it is compelling. It shifts between terror, heartbreak, and humour, creating a surreal, emotional experience. It is hard to sum up in one page what the book is about. As cliché as it sounds, but the journey really is more important than the ending here. There is a central mystery, and there is a plot that drives towards a climax, but the stops along the way are far more enjoyable. I felt confused at times and delighted at others.

I would recommend it to anyone in the mood for something weird and uncategorisable. It is a story you will be digesting for a long time.



I found Teju Cole-or rather, he found me-at a time when my mind was overwhelmed by noise. When I started reading Tremor, his words became an anchor. The chaos

quieted, the world slowed, and for the first time in a while, I could read again. Tremor offered comfort, a gentle pat on the back, but Open City went further. It understood me, meeting me where I was instead of demanding my full attention.

Open City is a meditative journey with Julius, a Nigerian-German psychiatrist in New York City, as he reflects on his past, identity, and the histories of the places he visits. Through his introspective walks, he explores themes of race, immigration, and cultural

This introspective novel felt like a comforting weight, a warm hand guiding me through different places while reminding me of the interconnectedness of history. The overlap of the past and the present is a constant reminder, every place you go to and step foot into is a palimpsest of past histories, and our identities are very much shaped by where we come from as by where we are. Julius' reflections on identity, memory, and history echoed in me, and through his own meditations, I was also given permission to wander on my own inside my mind. I was allowed to think and to ask without begging for answers, to know that it is enough just to sit with things and let it unfold or not unfold.




tragedy. My taste in literary preference always lay most prominently with the genres of the unknown, the knife-edge


thrill of a mystery, the fevered pitch of suspense leading up to a crescendo... splashed with a tinge of the esoteric, eerie or inexplicable.

One of my favourites is Russian Roulette, the 10th book in Anthony Horowitz's Alex Rider series. While the premise of a fourteen-year-old spy may seem typical, Horowitz's writing immerses you in the harsh, traumatic realities of

Although most of the series follows the perspective of Alex Rider, the tenth book is vastly different. It is set preseries, with a glance into another character entirely-Yassen Gregorovich, contract killer and assassin. Instead of a one-dimensional villain, Horowitz reveals Yassen's painful backstory, making him a memorable and tragic character. His journey is mirrored with Alex's, both trapped in their fates, unable to escape their circumstances.

It is a poignant, heart-wrenching, and surprisingly emotional book that does not hold back and packs quite a painful punch chapter by chapter. The book is exceptional at balancing both intricate themes and grey areas that many novels often struggle to expand upon. I adore the style in which he writes, incorporating tension and beautifully written action scenes without ever forgetting the undercurrent of humanity.





This book was highly anticipated, at least for me, as I had thoroughly enjoyed Yangsze Choo's previous two books, The Ghost Bride and The Night Tiger. These books were set in Malaysia, offering great historical portrayals of life in British Malaya. Just like Night Tiger, this story is told from two perspectives.

First, we follow Snow, a mother on a vengeful quest after losing her daughter. She embarks on a quest for revenge while working for a cursed family whose eldest sons die before 24. On the other side of the story, we meet Bao, a seasoned detective investigating a mysterious death linked to foxes. Their stories intertwine, creating this narrative that ties everything together in the end.

Infusing folklore, historical fiction and mysteries is just the charm of Yangsze Choo's storytelling. A powerful lead female character is not new to the author, but I found some of Snow's inner dialogue to be slightly immature and out of place. Nonetheless, this was still an enjoyable read. I adore Yangsze Choo's magic of incorporating humour into the characters' inner dialogue. It is witty and charming, and all the beautiful things that drew me into her works in the first place.





Currently a trainee solicitor at an international law firm in London, he completed his A-Levels at Sunway College in 2018 before going on to study Law at University College London (UCL), followed by a Master's at Oxford

University and his Legal Practice Course (LPC) at BPP University.

Congratulations John! Could you please share more for our readers who might not be familiar with the award?

The Freedom of the City of London is an ancient status granted by the City of London Corporation. Once offering trade rights and privileges like toll-free sheep driving across London Bridge, it is now largely symbolic but remains a prestigious link to the City's rich history.

low do you feel about this wonderful achievement I am truly honoured. The city's rich history as a hub for trade, law, and liveries has shaped my journey into a trainee solicitor.

I feel privileged to have pursued this path while also giving back to the Malaysian diaspora in the UK. Although launching a legal career can be all-consuming, I have always believed in making time for meaningful civic engagement.



As an A-Level alumnus at Sunway College, how has your experience here shaped your journey and success?

During my time at Sunway College, I was fortunate to have knowledgeable educators who genuinely cared about the wellbeing of their students. I want to particularly highlight Ms. Ida, my Psychology tutor, who is still teaching at Sunway College today. The writing classes she led to help us prepare for long essay questions continue to benefit me in my legal writing. More importantly, she took a genuine interest in my future and always lent a listening ear when I needed one.

How do you promote Malaysian culture and values in the UK through the British Malaysian Society BMS and the Malaysian Lawyers UK Network?

I volunteered at events and co-

led a mentorship programme for the British Malaysian Society, fostering UK-Malaysia connections and linking students with industry leaders. I also co-chair the Malaysian Lawyers UK Network, an organisation I co-founded last year with fellow Malaysian legal professionals. We established it upon realising there was no dedicated networking society for Malaysian lawyers practicing in the UK.

Is there any advice you would like to offer aspiring students?

My advice to all Sunwayians is to recognise that every organisation can benefit from the perspective of youth. Don't be intimidated by seniority-you deserve to be heard. Seek committee roles early to build your professional network, amplify the youth voice, and create meaningful impact.



What are some of our personal goals for the future, both professionally and in terms of giving back to the community?

Looking ahead, I'm eager to continue building my legal career and explore opportunities to serve on the boards of charities in London, using a youth perspective to positively shape governance and drive meaningful change.

Despite this, I have come to appreciate the food and beverages here, with my favourite dishes being Pan Mee and Nasi Ayam Gepuk. If I were to rate my overall experience, I would give it a solid 9 out of 10—losing a point because I occasionally miss my hometown in Indonesia.

After completing my studies, I plan to pursue a postgraduate degree in Interior Architecture in the UK. I have developed an interest in education and research, and becoming a lecturer is one of my long-term goals. I know this path requires further education and experience, but I am eager to take on the challenges ahead.

To fellow international students, when the journey feels tough and you are feeling lost, keep pushing forward. You might face moments where it seems like you are heading in the wrong direction or have hit a dead end but remember that perseverance is key. Even when you feel lonely or overwhelmed, trust that the struggles you face now will only make you stronger. If things do not work out the way you expect, keep believing in yourself, stay confident, and have faith that, eventually, you will reach your goals.





In a career marked by achievements, Zoel's selection as a member of the Obama Foundation Asia-Pacific Leaders community stands out as a pinnacle of recognition. She describes the experience as surreal, humble, and deeply inspiring. She attended exceptional training sessions, coupled with well-structured weekly sessions and personalised coaching.

During a workshop in Cambodia, Zoel had the privilege of sharing Malaysia's innovative use of AI and digital tools for SDG localisation with policymakers and diplomats. This opportunity reinforced her belief in the transformative power of technology and collective action.



Zoel's journey to success was not without challenges. Growing up in a family affected by drugs and gangsterism, she was almost a school dropout during her teenage years. Upon witnessing his newfound confidence and drive, Zoel recalls the experience being incredibly rewarding.




Sunway University Hits the Right Notes at PALMA 2024




