We-CARE Appreciation Ceremony - An Appreciation Ceremony was held to show our gratitude towards academic staff members who work hand-in-hand with the counselling team to create a nurturing and inclusive learning environment for all students.



The Art Beats Festival 2023 - A collaborative effort between Sunway University and Lancaster University, showcased a diverse range of artistic expressions and celebrated 15 years of partnership between these institutions, reinforcing the connections between Lancaster Institute for Contemporary Arts (LICA) and Sunway's School of Arts.



Sunway TES and ICAEW Partnership Prospers - Sunway TES Malaysia and the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales (ICAEW) have successfully renewed their partnership. It also marked the start of the partnership with Sunway TES Iskandar College. Additionally, Sunway TES presented the ICAEW Global Accountant Scholarship Award, marking 854 scholarship recipients since the start of their collaboration.

From Sunway to Stanford: The Story of Shin Jie, a Top 2% Researcher



The excitement, joy and pride that we feel, seeing a fellow Malaysian being recognised globally for their success, is no doubt a special moment for us. Even more so when our fellow Sunwayian has made it onto Stanford University's Top 2% Researchers list!

Yong Shin Jie, a budding 23-year-old has remarkably immortalised his name on the list with his paper on COVID-19 and long-COVID, a post-COVID syndrome. Oh and did we mention? He achieved this remarkable feat all while still pursuing a master's degree in Life Sciences, specialising in neurosciences.

His story with science started off with an interest in biology during his secondary school days at St. Andrew's School in Brunei, further providing him the confidence to go down this path thanks to his excellent results in the subject. Hailing from Bandar Seri Begawan, Shin Jie has been studying in Malaysia (specifically Sunway) since the age of 16. Sunway has always been his first choice due to the rare and interesting combination of Biology with Psychology degree. He subsequently pursued his master's degree and the decision to remain with Sunway was attributed to the genuine appreciation and support he received from the University and lecturers.

Shin Jie shared that he was motivated to write a review paper on long-COVID due to the lack of information on the topic in existing academic literature. His study was recognised and cited by numerous academics worldwide. In addition to this research, Shin Jie has also authored more than 10 other papers. One of the key factors to achieving this impressive

track record at such a young age is having an analytical and determined mindset, a skill that Shin Jie learned from his lecturers, Associate Professor Dr Audrey and Associate Professor Dr Jactty.

The young researcher has an immense passion in scientific writing as well. He sees writing as a form of art which engages both the creative and intellectual minds. "I believe writing is one of the skills that can bring you anywhere when mastered correctly. Almost all high-end careers — academia, law, or business — demand good prose," he said.

Looking back on his journey, he recalled that his first academic paper took a lot of effort and time, spanning almost a year as he was still a novice writer. Overtime with every subsequent paper, his skills improved. "A realisation also struck me when I was young - my future self is also me. So, I always strive to conduct myself in a manner my future self would be proud of. Of course, I sometimes fall short of my standards, so the ability to get back on track is also important," Shin Jie added.

When he is not hours deep into his research, Shin Jie is just like any other youngster, spending most of his free time at the gym because guess what? Shin Jie also happens to be a competitive powerlifter! This chap is really one overachiever who shines in various aspects. Other times, you will find him watching some anime to unwind and spending time with his loved ones. How else does the talented and bright youngster keep his well-being in check,

you wonder? Sharing tips on managing stress and avoiding burnout, Shin Jie recommended regular exercise because a better health, both physically and mentally, helps in increased resilience against fatigue.

Shin Jie's strategy to achieve optimum productivity and focus levels can be obtained through training, so start small and improve gradually - like how you would get fitter physically by adding incremental workload over time. He said that any leisure time he can get is a bonus, which helps him to practise gratitude.

Concerning his achievements and success in the field of research, Shin Jie expressed his contentment with science (general) and scientific (academic) writing as a means of earning a living, which he has been doing since 2020. He enjoys the freedom and flexibility to work anywhere and to dive into any topics that he is interested in. Moving forward, he does hope to embark on a PhD journey, but it will not be anytime soon, and not until he finds a topic that he is keen enough to dedicate 3-5 years to.

Final words of advice from our talented Sunwayian to fellow young minds, who aspire to shine bright in their respective fields, is to not wait for opportunities; create them by, for example, starting a new daunting project, ideally something unique. "My work was highly cited because it was novel at that time. So, think outside the box and contemplate how you can contribute to scientific literature, in my case. And do be patient, as great projects take consistent effort and time," he said.

26 Sunway University scientists placed in Top 2%

26 scientists from Sunway University were named on Stanford University's highly-cited Top 2% list. This remarkable achievement signifies that 6% of Sunway University's academic faculty is recognised on this list, which is three times the global average. Stanford University's selection criteria for this list encompass two criteria: their career-long citation impact and their single-year citation impact. This indicates that Sunway University's scientists are exceptionally influential in their respective research fields, making substantial contributions to the existing body of academic knowledge.



Sunway University students win Nationwide Blockchain Hackathon

Congratulations to the students from the School of Engineering and Technology who made Sunway University proud as they won the Nationwide Blockchain Hackathon. With over 400 applications received from universities across Malaysia, four Sunway University students made it to the Top 5, winning a total of USD 650. They achieved this feat with their project called "Mint Cycle", which aims to enhance the ESG footprint of companies in Malaysia by utilising a smart recycling machine. Team "Mint Cycle" will also represent Sunway University in the international blockchain hackathon, Hyperdrive.

Hailing from Alor Setar, Kedah, Cambridge A-Level alumna cum professional Malaysian squash player Wong Heng Wai has received a spot to pursue her studies as a student athlete at Yale University and she will be playing for the Yale Squash Team. This is truly a dream come true for the young Kedahan who has always aspired to study in an Ivy League School and to participate in the College Squash Association (CSA) in the United States.

It all started back in Standard 1, when Heng Wai took part in the Kedah Squash Racket Association selection. She slowly developed a deep passion for squash and with the support of her family and teachers, Heng Wai eventually set her goal to strive towards becoming a student-athlete.

Heng Wai received the women's singles title at the Professional Squash Association (PSA) World Squash Federation (WSF) Satellite Tour in 2023. She also won the girls' Under-17 title at the US Junior Open Squash Championships in 2019. She currently ranks #145 on the PSA World Tour chart.

While athlete training takes up six days a week, it is

difficult to juggle between studies and squash training. A pro tip from the national squash player is to always plan a schedule and list down the tasks that need to be completed on a weekly or monthly basis.

Driven by her determination and hard work, Heng Wai successfully scored IOAs in her SPM exam. With advice from her seniors, Heng Wai decided to pursue Cambridge A-Level studies at Sunway College, and obtained a remarkable result of 2A*s and 1A.

When asked about her experience studying at Sunway College, Heng Wai said "The lecturers here were very supportive and thoughtful. They understood my busy schedule as a student athlete, and they gave me extra guidance to catch up on the subjects and syllabus that I have missed. I am also grateful for meeting a bunch of like-minded friends, who shared similar goals and worked hard towards achieving them."

Heng Wai is currently taking a gap year to focus on her sports career as a full-time athlete where she continues to train, gain experience from elite players while she represents Malaysia to compete in professional tournaments.

Echo Eats: Malaysian Food Reimagined

In the heart of Malaysia's culinary tapestry lies a rich and flavourful tradition that has been lovingly passed down through generations, creating a harmonious symphony of tastes and aromas that have stood the test of time. Malaysian cuisine is known for its diverse influences and distinctive flavours, and has been an integral part of the nation's cultural identity. But as the world evolves and palates broaden, a captivating transformation has taken place—one where local, traditional comfort foods have gracefully embraced the winds of modernisation.

Experience Malaysia's rich flavours with a menu that takes you through some of the nation's iconic dishes.

The Tour of Malaysia begins with dishes such as the Fish Cracker, a crunchy ball of anchovies and fermented chilli, inspired by lekor; and distinct garlic and truffle-flavoured charcoal-grilled baby corn served with glazed kulim oil. There is also the 0.00% Yeast, a bread-like dish made of tapioca and fermented black beans served with a green chilli emulsion for a little kick.



For the mains, guests can choose between barramundi, also known as Asian sea bass, marinated with the flavours of turmeric and bird eye chilli, or a lamb rack served with a roasted garlic puree and a longan reduction.

Dessert features Kuih Loyang, a deep-fried festive cookie. Beta's take on Loyang Vol. 3 involves a white chocolate outer shell and filling the kuih with red bean before coating it with fragrant, toasted sesame seeds.

RED RED BOTAK HEAD



Nestled within the shelves of contemporary bestsellers and classic novels, Red Red Botak Head serves local dishes with creative and playful twists.

Combining pasta and shoyu eggs with Japanese eel fillets, the Unagi Laksa is one of the restaurant's highlights. This dish is immersed in a hearty laksa broth specially curated by the chef to complement the unagi.

Imagine a plate of Ondeh-Ondeh, a pandan infused ball of dough filled with gula melaka and rolled in grated coconut. Now, envision an elevated twist where this humble kuih is artfully crafted into a choux, better known as cream puff. This bestselling pandan choux is not only piped with pandan pastry cream and gula melaka, but it also bursts when you take a bite, just like how the original would!



With each bite of modern Malaysian food, you become a witness to Malaysia's culinary story being retold in captivating and unexpected ways. This evolution is not a departure from tradition, but a celebration of it—a testament to the adaptability and creativity of Malaysian chefs. It is a journey where the past and the future intertwine, and the flavours of Malaysia continue to captivate hearts, old and new.

One experience that most Malaysians share is an "open house", inviting family and friends to our homes during the festive season. OpenHouse aims to emulate the warm hospitality of welcoming guests into your home, dishing up recreated traditional household recipes and unique creations.

Sample the Umai Prawn Borneo, the restaurant's reinterpretation of umai, a popular traditional dish in Sarawak. Prawn ceviche is tossed in calamansi juice and wrapped in betel leaves with ginger flower, cili padi, dried shrimp, and nuts - a little package of bright and refreshing flavours.

Sambal, a spicy dipping sauce made by pounding chillies and other ingredients in a pestle, can be unique to each state and region; even families pass down their recipes through generations. So, there is no doubt that OpenHouse has a variety of sambals on their menu. Among the selection are Temu Pauh, sambal infused with a green mango scent from a ginger-like root; Lengkuas; Tempoyak, flavoured with fermented durian and aubergine; Isi Rong; Kepayang, featuring the black jungle nut; Kulat Kukur; and Neraka.

OpenHouse also serves dishes like Pais Barramundi (barramundi wrapped in lerek leaves and baked with turmeric, shredded coconut, and chilli padi), Laksa Johor (spaghetti with white mackerel meat, shrimp, and vegetables), and Nasi Lemak Beef Rendang.



ATAS



The Cultural Heritage dinner menu at ATAS features elevated Asian favourites with original and inspiring combinations of locally harvested and heirloom produce.

The dinner commences with a symphony of sweet and savoury flavours in the form of cucur Kapitan and mud crab sambal with hints of petai, served with soya milk loaf bread and pandan butter.

There is also a Japanese Squid Kerabu that incorporates fresh flavours from caramelised pomelo, an umbra vinaigrette, mint, and 48-hours salted duck egg yolk; and a Mentaiko Otak-Otak made with blue mackerel and aged mimolette cheese.

Asam pedas, a classic Malaysian dish, gets a unique approach as it takes centre stage as the main course in the form of a risotto. This risotto is made with sakura shrimp, blue belly shrimp, paku pakis, and winged beans.

A delicate and meticulously crafted dessert emerges as the menu unfolds to a sweet conclusion. Each bite of the heirloom carrot and nutmeg ice cream dessert is a homage to Chef Mandy Goh's Penang roots, intertwining the flavours of nutmeg, gula melaka, and calamansi.



BIJAN

Bijan is a modern restaurant that specialises in Malay cuisine, with their menu ranging from kampung dishes to everyday favourites.

The appetisers include finger-foods that are well-known and loved by many: Popiah Goreng, crispy deep-fried vegetable spring rolls; Cucur Udang, deep-fried prawn and vegetable fritters; and Satay.

The Gulai Lemak Daging Salai dengan Jantung Pisang is among some of the noteworthy and innovative items on the menu. In this dish, banana flowers are simmered in a creamy turmeric gravy and finished with tender slices of chargrilled Australian sirloin.

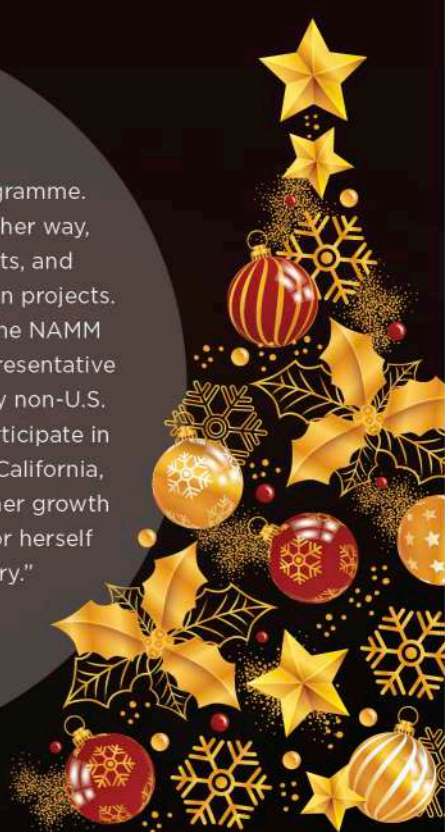

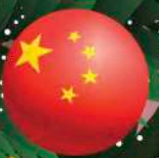

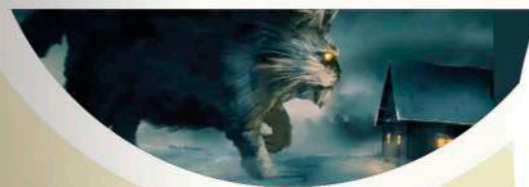


ICELAND

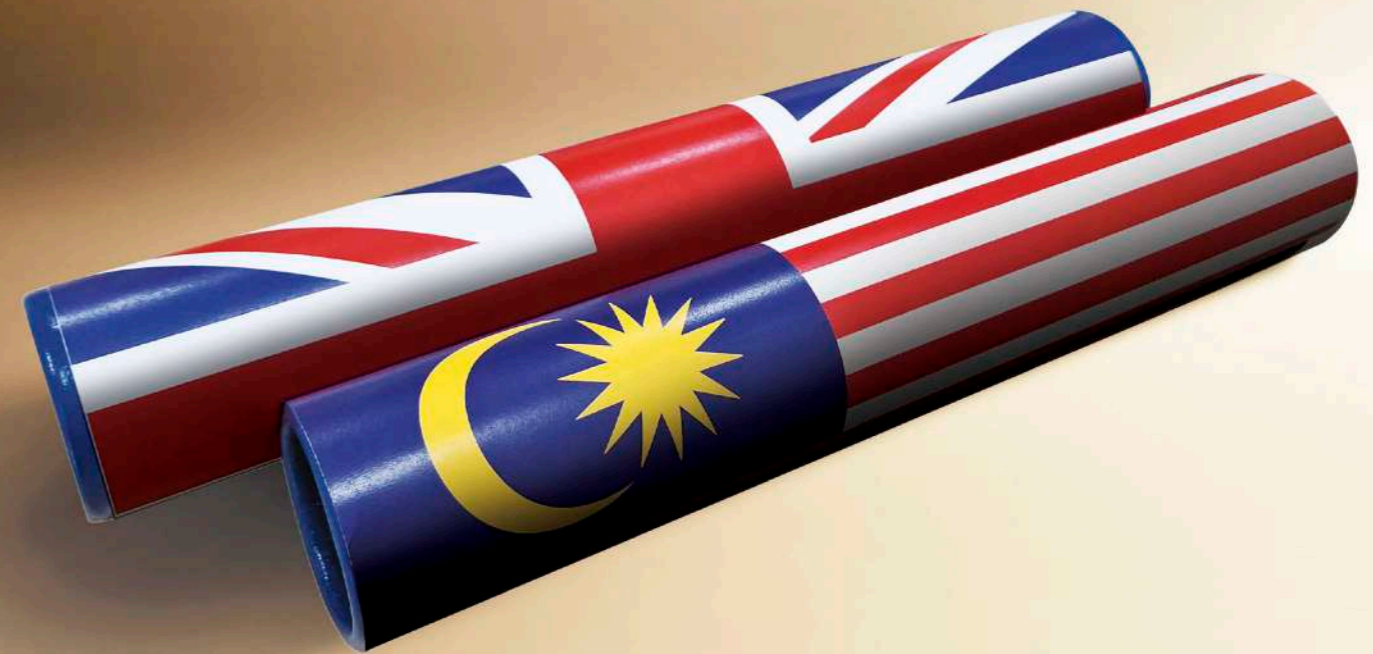
